

I. Use a knife to slice the potato in half. Put a spoonful of butter or spread between the two halves and press them back together.





3. Leave it to cook for 20 minutes. Then, use tongs to turn it over. After another 20 minutes, take it out.



4. Wearing an oven glove or mitt, squeeze the potato. If it feels soft it's ready to eat. If not, put it back in until it's done.



5. Leave the potato to cool for 10 minutes. Unwrap it and eat straight from the foil. You could add some grated cheese too.

#### Corn on the cob

#### Ingredients:

corn on the cob still in its husk (with its leaves on)

butter or spread



1. Soak the corn in water for an hour.





3. After 20-25 minutes, use tongs to take the corn out of the fire. Leave it to cool for ten minutes.



4. Carefully unwrap the foil and take off the leaves. Spread a teaspoon of butter or spread over the kernels and eat straight away.

When you've finished with your fire, always put it out with water or sand. Take all your litter and equipment away with you.

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

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



### Setting up camp

When choosing the perfect camping spot there are important things to consider.



Putting up a tent is called pitching. Look around and try to find the best spot before you pitch your tent.



Rivers and lakes attract insects and can flood in heavy rain, so don't pitch too close to water. If you're on a slope, make sure the door is downhill, so rainwater doesn't run into it. Make sure you have a water supply nearby too.



Find a patch of flat ground and clear any sticks and stones from the tent site. Sticks can be used as firewood (see opposite).

Fires are essential for keeping campers warm and provide a place to cook a hearty meal. Always get permission before building a fire and look for designated areas that allow it.






